Precautions Against Child Predation

Online child predators can interact with children through a variety of channels: computers, video games, handheld gaming devices and mobile phones. These tools make millions of people accessible at your child’s fingertips... and vice-versa. Paradoxically, young people asserting their individuality online remain very vulnerable to predation. Their innocence, natural curiosity, desire for attention, ingrained trust in adults, and/or desire to rebel against their parents can lead them into the path of someone who could harm them.

WHAT CHILDREN CAN DO

Activities that may seem fairly harmless to your child can lure the attention of predators. Here are some precautions your child can take – with your help – that may help him or her steer clear of online predators.

Profile and content. The profile information and content you generate is critical. The images, opinions and personal information you share can be used by others to manipulate you, blackmail you, or literally locate you. Use a neutral profile photo that doesn’t show your face; consider a photo of an object or landscape. Never take nude or semi-nude photos of yourself or allow someone else to do so. Remember, anything you say or post can live forever online if re-posted by someone else.

Screen names. Select gender-neutral and age-appropriate screen names for yourself. You can inadvertently give out a lot about yourself with a screen name like “britt98” (Brittany, born in 1998?). Screen names that suggest sex, violence or drugs, which might seem fun or funny, can draw attention from the wrong people.

Privacy settings. On Facebook and other social sites, lock down your privacy settings so that only your approved friends can

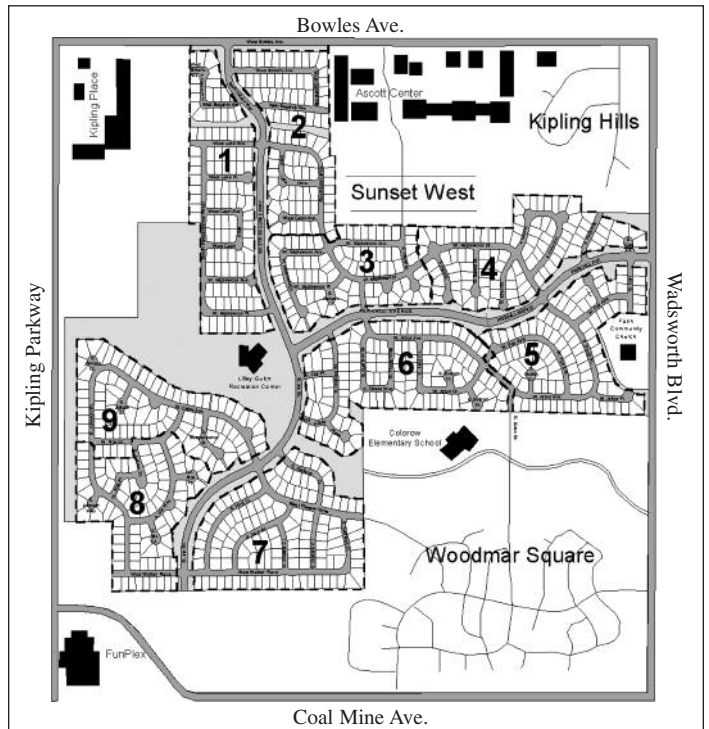

see your photos, video and updates. Leaving privacy open is like inviting strangers to tag along with you everywhere you go.

Friends list. While it may be tempting to build the largest friend list possible, to appear more connected or popular, you should only accept friend requests from people you actually know, and trust.

Say no to creepers. If you are contacted, in any format, by someone you don't know, do not respond. Use your settings to block that person from contacting you. Never agree to meet someone in person whom you met online. If you're contacted by an adult you know, talk to your parents about the communication.

WHAT PARENTS CAN DO

Every child is different. Different ages, maturity levels and special circumstances will dictate what's appropriate for each child. The most important thing parents can do is stay involved with kids' online activities, and help them understand the dangers. Sooner or later they'll be on their own, and will need that foundation of online common-sense. Until then...

Keep a computer in a well-trafficked room in your home. Remember that smartphones are just small computers... limit private access to them as well.

Stay involved in your child's online activities. Insist on access (including passwords!) to social networking, e-mail, texting and gaming. Check them periodically.

Find out what online safeguards are in place at your child's school, friends' homes, and any other place where your child may be using computers or video games. Consider downmarket mobile phones that don't offer photo, video or Internet capabilities.

Remember that predators aren't always strangers. "Grooming" by trusted adults plays a huge role in child predation. Watch for changes in your child's relationships with adults in his/her life. Adults who work with children and teens have professional boundaries; cultivating significant online or text-based relationships with individual children is not appropriate.

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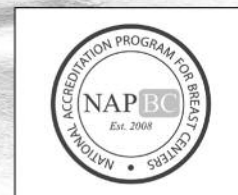
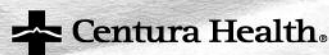

Swings, Slides, and Jungle Gyms: Focus on Playground Safety

If you have kids, you probably know the many bumps and bruises they can collect when they play outside. Playgrounds can be great places for children not only to have fun outside, but also to exercise while they're doing it.

However, certain playground elements pose a risk to young children if there isn't proper supervision. Be on the lookout for possible hazards that can be present at any given playground, and consider the following:

- **Surfaces.** Different surfaces can have varying results if a child slips and falls. Younger children should avoid concrete and asphalt. Cushioned surfaces, such as rubber mats that are 12 inches deep, should be around any equipment that's 8 feet high.
- **Maintenance.** If something looks broken or worn down, such as a swing, don't let your child use it. Broken equipment can be a big hazard, so if you notice something that's suspicious, keep your children away from it.
- **Other kids.** It's not just playground equipment that can be dangerous; other children can pose a peril, too. If you don't supervise your kids, there's a chance other kids will take the opportunity to pick on them.
- **Other hazards.** Broken glass, chains, pieces of metal, and plastics can all be quite dangerous. If an area of the playground is filled with junk, falling and getting cut is a possibility. If an area looks unclean, keep your children away from there, and notify the appropriate official or organization about cleaning up the playground.

Trick or Treat? Enjoy Halloween With a Safe Costume

Halloween is coming, and your children are no doubt excited by the prospect of dressing up as their favorite animal, superhero, or celebrity. But as a parent it's your responsibility to be sure they're safe as they walk from house to house trick-or-treating in their costumes. Keep these tips and precautions in mind:

- Flame retardant materials are a must. Check the label on any costume you buy from a store. If you're making your child's outfit, use only synthetic, flame-retardant fabrics.
- Try costumes on before the big night. This gives you time to make any alterations necessary. You want the costume to be loose enough for your children to wear a sweater on a chilly night, but not so baggy that they'll trip, or snag an arm or leg. Be careful of capes that might drag or trip a child.
- Don't blend into the dark. A bright, colorful costume is best, but if your child is determined to dress as Batman or the Grim Reaper, a few strips of reflective tape will help him or her show up more effectively in streetlights and car headlights.
- Avoid bulky masks. Makeup is usually better than a mask, as long as it's nontoxic and doesn't contain anything likely to cause an allergic reaction. Masks that are difficult to remove quickly can be hazardous in an emergency. If your child insists on a mask, make sure the ear, nose, and mouth openings are wide enough for him or her to see and breathe easily.
- Wear comfortable shoes. You don't want your little princess stumbling over high heels. Children walking door to door (accompanied by you or another adult, of course) should wear sneakers or some other reasonable footwear.

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Sometimes It Is, In Fact, Lupus

Contrary to what one cranky television doctor (House, M.D.) would like you to believe, lupus is a very real disease that hundreds of thousands of people deal with every day. Lupus is an autoimmune disease in which the patient's immune system attacks healthy parts of his or her own body, resulting in inflammation, swelling, and pain, among other symptoms.

What can make lupus dangerous is when it attacks vital organs such as the heart, lungs, or liver. It is more likely to affect women than men, as well as people of non-European descent. However, if caught early, those affected by lupus have a good chance of living normal and healthy lives.

Symptoms of lupus include the following, and if it seems like many apply to yourself, you may want to visit your doctor:

- **Fatigue.** Most people who have from lupus suffer fatigue whenever the disease is about to flare up. This is a near-universal symptom regardless of how strong or mild the case is.
- **Joint and muscle pain.** Arthritis is another common side effect of lupus. Almost three-fourths of all patients report joint and muscle pain to be the first sign that they have lupus. Look for arthritis in the wrists, small joints of the hands, elbows, knees, and ankles.
- **Skin irritation.** Many lupus patients wind up with skin rashes, especially on the face. Sores, flaky red spots, and scaly rashes are also possible, and can be located on the face, neck, back, hands, and arms.
- **Chest pain.** The disease can cause inflammation of the heart and the lungs, which can result in very strong chest pains that can put people at an increased risk of a heart attack or a stroke.

Celebrities who have had lupus include singers Michael Jackson, Lady Gaga, and Toni Braxton, as well as My Favorite Martian actor Ray Walston.
